To meet state goals, each year Anson County needs:

- Anson County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment (goal: 75% vs. 101%). 2022
- 778 more 3-8 graders earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading (goal: 73% vs. 16%). 2022
- 954 more 3-8 graders earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math (goal: 87% vs. 16%). 2022
- 18 more 9th graders to graduate within four years (goal: 95% vs. 88%).
- 832 more students to attend school regularly (goal: 11% chronic absenteeism vs. 39%). 2021








