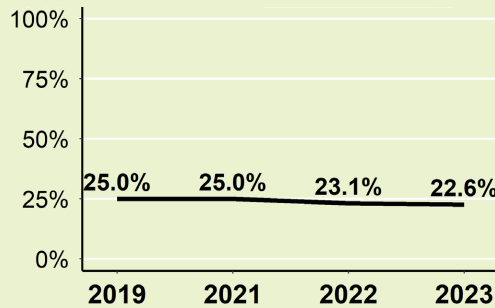

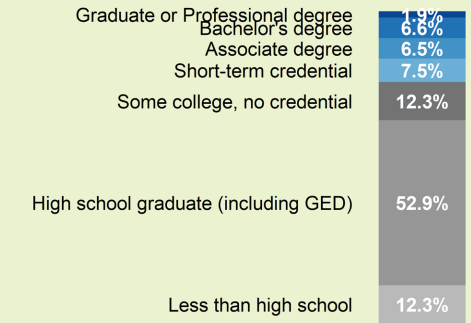

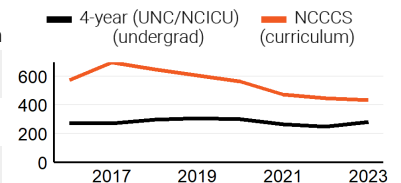

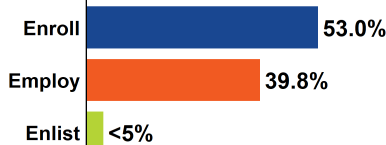


FAFSA Completion

42% of Anson County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the rural - metro county average of 52%.

42.2% of 2024 high school class completed the FAFSA as of Sept. 27, 2024. 65 more need to complete in 2024 to meet state goal of 80%. Peer: 52.0% | State: 55.0%

Post High School Graduation Intentions

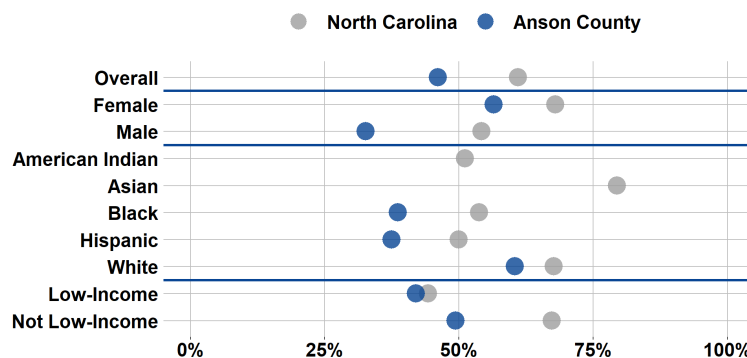

Chronic Absenteeism

48% of Anson County students are chronically absent from school, above the rural - metro county average of 29%.

74.5% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program in 2024. 1 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. Peer: 61.7% | State: 57.2%

Anson County Traditional Public Schools students:

15.8% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in reading in 2024. 747 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. Peer: 25.3% | State: 29.8%

20.4% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in math in 2024. 855 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. Peer: 32.3% | State: 36.5%

47.9% of students were chronically absent from school in 2023. 1,140 fewer needed to meet state goal of 11%. Peer: 28.9% | State: 27.5%



Anson County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 361:1 compared to 358:1 in peer counties. 2024

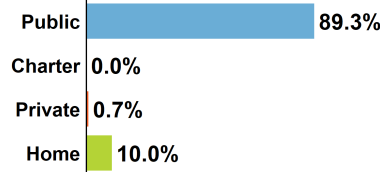

Pathways to College and Career

Students in traditional public schools completed 1,059 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials and 151 concentrations. 85 (8.0%) of credentials were industry-valued in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations: Transportation, Distribution, & Logistics; Health Science; and Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources.



42 (5%) high school students took at least one AP, IB, or CIE exam. State: 16.8% (2023).



80 (44.2%) high school graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs. State: 35.5% (2023).
