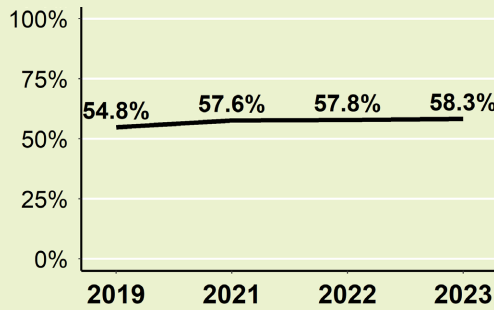

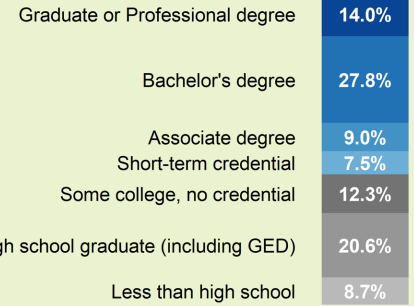

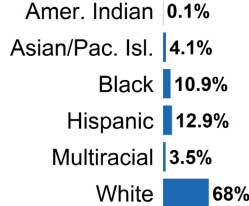

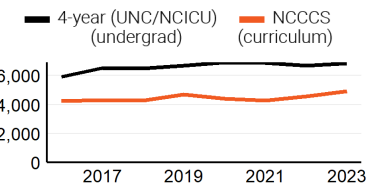

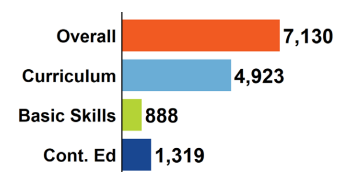

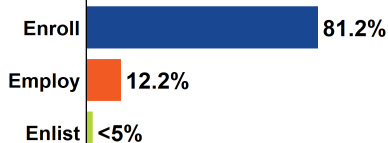


FAFSA Completion

59.5% of 2024 high school class completed the FAFSA as of Sept. 27, 2024. 671 more need to complete in 2024 to meet state goal of 80%. Peer: 55.0% | State: 55.0%

Post High School Graduation Intentions

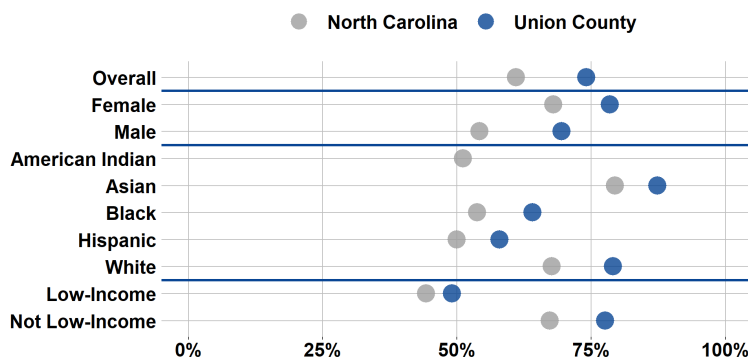

Top Opportunities for Growth



NC Pre-K Enrollment

33% of Union County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the suburban county average of 46%.

33.0% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program in 2024. 365 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. Peer: 46.5% | State: 57.2%

Union County Traditional Public Schools students:

42.9% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in reading in 2024. 5,641 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. Peer: 30.8% | State: 29.8%

57.7% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in math in 2024. 5,301 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. Peer: 37.8% | State: 36.5%

18.6% of students were chronically absent from school in 2023. 3,273 fewer needed to meet state goal of 11%. Peer: 25.3% | State: 27.5%



Union County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 329:1 compared to 328:1 in peer counties. 2024



0.8% of students drop out of high school (124 total students), compared to 2.1% statewide. 2023

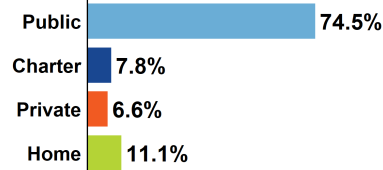

Pathways to College and Career

Students in traditional public schools completed 12,985 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials and 1,836 concentrations. 3,293 (25.4%) of credentials were industry-valued in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations: Health Science; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Arts, Audio/Video Technology, & Communications.



3,240 (22.9%) high school students took at least one AP, IB, or CIE exam. State: 16.8% (2023).



1,076 (31.9%) high school graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs. State: 35.5% (2023).
